Coding Team

This month we would like to introduce you to our coding team.

What is a coder?

Our coders read every single letter and email that is sent to us. They then highlight any diagnosis and any tests that have been done by other services for a patient's medical records, this is known as coding. They then send the document on to the correct department to action. This may be the GP for medical diagnosis follow up or the SCA team for follow up blood tests or referrals.

Our coders work 7 days per week and on average they read/code 200 emails per day, 100 online uploaded documents and 50 postal documents. This totals to over 2000 documents per week that are read word by word and processed as necessary.

Depending on which department you have seen, depends on how quickly the letters are sent to our coders. Departments that are more urgent for example, Oncology. Letters are sent very quickly after appointments usually in a matter of days to ensure the continuity of care.

Cardiology/Diabetes/Respiratory etc. are usually sent to the coders within a few weeks of your appointment and other non-urgent clinic letters, for example, Orthopaedics can sometimes take a few months to be sent to the surgery.

The coding team work closely with the SCA team and Medical Secretary team to chase any outstanding urgent clinic letters to make sure we are up to date on any changes to medication/urgent blood tests.

The team also process all the DEXA and Mammogram scan results which arrive in the thousands into the surgery.

When you register at The Lodge Health Partnership, our coders download the electronic transfer of your records. If this download fails or incomplete data downloads, the coding team must summerise your paper documents after they arrive, this usually takes around 8 weeks to be received by the surgery. Summerising consists of checking the whole paper record against the electronic record to make sure nothing is missing. If any data is missing the team must code the missing data into your records. They summerise around 30 sets of notes each week.

Blood Tests

How we contact you

When you are due a blood test our admin team or a GP will contact you. This will either be by telephone to make you a surgery appointment or we will text/email you a link to your blood test form. This link will contact the word accurx and is a genuine message from the surgery. We ask that you attend for your bloods as soon as possible or when directed by the GP if a follow up blood test is required.

Blood Tests

What you need to do

If you are sent a link containing your form. Please print this form at home and take it with you to your local walk-in blood clinic. They are unable to print the form for you. If you are unable to print at home, please collect a copy of your form from the surgery. If you are housebound, we can organise for the community team to take your bloods.

Where you need to go

The details of the local blood clinics and the times can be found on the bottom of your blood form. They will be unable to see you if you do not have a paper copy of your form.

Children under 5 must be seen in a paediatric clinic with a booked appointment slot. We will send you the details of this clinic with your form.

Know Yours Numbers! Week

Every September, blood pressure checks are taken by thousands to prevent heart attacks and strokes.

Previously, hundreds of organisations took part, setting up Pressure Stations in public places across the UK. From hospitals and health centres to offices, car parks and supermarkets. Even the Royal Albert Hall. Today, the Know Your Numbers! Week focus is on home blood pressure monitoring, as it's the easiest way to find out your blood pressure numbers.

The Lodge Health Partnership will be taking part in KYN Week and will be hosting Pressure Stations at all 3 surgeries from 4th – 8th September between 1pm-2pm.

We also have a blood pressure machine in every waiting room during our opening hours that can be used by our patients if they do not have a machine at home. (Please remember to sit quietly for 5 minutes before taking a reading)

We would also like our patients to prioritize taking their blood pressure throughout September and if you notice your blood pressure average is over 135/80, please submit your weeks readings to the surgery for review. We will contact you if you need a review with a GP.

- If your BP is under 120/80 this is considered a normal blood pressure. Please recheck every 5 years
- If your BP is between 121/81 – 139/89, you are at risk of a high blood pressure. Please submit 7 days readings, taking 1 in the morning and 1 in the evening and submit your readings to the surgery.
- If your BP is between 140/90 - 159/99, please book a routine GP appointment, purchase a BP machine for home and take 4 days readings twice daily before your appointment.
- If your BP is over 160/100, please contact the surgery for a same day/next day appointment for a review.
